You Are Cordially Invited To A Reception At The Home Of M.J. And Emily Clark 1033 Lake Drive, Grand Rapids Sunday Afternoon, October 29, 2006

Emily Jewell Clark was listed in Society Blue Books just after the turn of the twentieth century with the notation "Receives Wednesday". After the death of her husband, Melvin, she added an addition to their Lake Drive home that served as an art gallery and there she hosted women's groups and art enthusiasts for teas and art lectures. You can get a feel for her hospitality yourself this October 29th from 1:00 pm to 4:00 pm in the home she occupied for approximately thirty years, now Mangiamo's Restaurant.

Clark Retirement Community, formerly the M.J. Clark Memorial Home, is sponsoring the event to celebrate their centennial. Clark Home, which originated with a significant gift from M.J. and Emily Clark, opened on Sherman Street in 1906. The book, *Caring Community: A History of Clark Retirement Community* by Jennifer Morrison and Gordon Olson, will be released at the October 29th event. Morrison, of the Greater Grand Rapids Women's History Council, the Grand Rapids Public Library's local history department, and MI-Stories.com; and City Historian Emeritus, Olson, will present a brief program and refreshments will be served.

October 12, *Icebound: Found!*, Craig Rich, Great Lakes diver and Valerie Olson van Heest, founder of the Underwater Archaeological Society of Chicago

Video presentation and discussion: The story of the S.S. Michigan is MSRA's most exciting video documentary. This tale includes a reenactment of the final days of West Michigan's most famous passenger steamer. Icebound on Lake Michigan for over 40 days in 1885, the SS Michigan's crew braved the elements and struggled for survival during one of the worst winters in history. This 2006 documentary includes underwater video of the newly discovered shipwreck.

November 9, No Day to Surrender: the 25th Michigan's Stand Against Morgan in the Battle of Tebbs Bend, Betty J. Gorin,

author from Taylor County Kentucky of "Morgan is Coming!" Confederate Raiders in the Heartland of Kentucky

Confederate Raiders in the Heartland of Kentucky Morgan is Coming! was the cry that spread fear and panic in Kentucky during the Civil War. Gorin's book is a narrative of the exploits of John Hunt Morgan and his cavalrymen, but her talk will focus on a littleknown Michigan colonel, Orlando H. Moore and Michigan's 25th and the battle at Tebbs Bend, Green River Bridge, July 4, 1863.

February 8, Backlash to Reform: The Ku Klux Klan and the Rise of New Deal

Michigan, Matthew L. Daley, Professor of History, Grand Valley State University Using the KKK's involvement in local politics in Detroit and Grand Rapids, Matthew Daley will discuss the true nature of the North's encounter with the United States' most notorious secret society. Close examination of these communities will show how their citizens' responses to the KKK affected their cities' political landscapes and resulted in the first stirrings of the "New Deal Coalition" of the 1930s.

March 8, The Variety of Women's Contributions to Grand Rapids Architecture, and the Specific Case of 1920s Home Designer Fannie Boylon,

Rebecca Smith-Hoffman, Principal, Past Perfect, Marcella Beck, Grand Rapids Public Library, GR History and Special Collections. Offered with the Greater Grand Rapids Women's History Council.

From raising money for the institutional homes of clubs and churches to drawing up inspirational housing plans themselves, Grand Rapids women historically have helped shape their built environment. Rebecca Smith-Hoffman will survey the wide array of women involved as architects of community pride, and Marcella Beck will report on prolific designer Fannie Boylon. Self-taught, Boylon was the brains behind some 1200 technologically progressive and aesthetically distinctive homes built in Grand Rapids between 1910 and 1930.

April 12, *Touring Opera Companies in Grand Rapids: From the Ridiculous to the Sublime*, Professor Gilbert R. Davis, Grand Valley State University, Emeritus, Department of English

Beginning in the middle of the 19th century, Italian and American opera companies crisscrossed the nation bringing opera, grand and not-so-grand to the provinces. Grand Rapids audiences were graced with Emma Abbot's celebrated English Grand Opera Company and Anna Pavlova's Boston National Opera Company. But there were also many fly-bynight operators and local audiences got their share of turkeys.

May 10, *Trains, Boats, Buggies & Mules: Grand Rapids Botanist Emma J. Cole's Nineteenth-Century Quest for Plants,* Julie Christianson Stivers, Public Museum of Grand Rapids

For twenty-six school years from 1881 to 1907, the devoted and demure Emma J. Cole taught botany at Grand Rapids' Central High School. Come summer, she turned into *Continued on Page 4*

Indiana Jane, a pioneer naturalist known far and wide for, reputedly, the largest private herbarium in Michigan (3581 specimens), her comprehensive book on Grand Rapids plants (still the only one; it actually covers 600 square miles), her worldwide collecting trips and subsequent work with famous universities and scholars. A Progressive Era member of the Kent Scientific Institute, Cole remains the most notable female governor of this precursor to the Public Museum of Grand Rapids.

2006 Great Lakes History Conference Friday and Saturday, October 20-21, 2006

The Thirty-first Annual Great Lakes History Conference, sponsored by Grand Valley State University, will be held Friday and Saturday, October 20-21, 2006, at GVSU's Eberhard Center in downtown Grand Rapids. The conference features panels on a variety of historical topics. Co-sponsored by the **Ryerson Foundation of the Grand Rapids Public Library, Grand Rapids Historical Commission, Grand Rapids Historical Society**, and **Greater Grand Rapids Women's History Council**, the GLHC provides unique opportunity for exchange between public and academic historians. Area citizens can attend the conference for a modest fee (the general public for \$20 and sponsoring group members for \$15) which includes lunch on Saturday, continental breakfast on Saturday morning, a reception at the conference's end, and snacks in-between. The four Grand Rapids-sponsored history panels are scheduled only on Saturday, the 21st, but conferees are welcome to attend all conference events on both days.

2006 Conference Theme: New Perspectives on War and Society

This year's conference features two renowned keynote speakers. Following lunch on Saturday, the 21st, **Professor Omer Bartov** from Brown University will speak about racial war and extermination. His books include *The Crimes of War: Guilt and Denial in the Twentieth Century, Hitler's Army,* and most recently *The 'Jew' in Cinema: From The Golem to Don't Touch My Holocaust.* On Friday evening, the 20th, **Dr. Jonathan Shay** will address the medical and social responses to combat trauma, documented in his *Achilles in Vietnam: Combat Trauma and the Undoing of Character* and *Odysseus in America: Combat Trauma and the Trials of Homecoming* (with a forward by Senators John McCain and Max Cleland). Another Session Sneak Preview

Once again the GGRWHC has teamed up with the Grand Rapids Historical Society, the Grand Rapids Historical Commission, and the Grand Rapids Public Library to sponsor four panels highlighting area history at GVSU's Great Lakes History Conference on Saturday, October 21. Check out the complete women's history programming on the full conference schedule http://www.gvsu.edu/history, but note especially the panel titled *Rosie's Mom & Susan B's Daughters: Grand Rapids Women Mobilize for War*, scheduled at 3:30 p.m. just before the closing reception.

Diana Barrett's paper for that panel will feature a virtually unknown and untouched treasure trove of genealogical, social, and historical data that for 90 years has been sitting in the Grand Rapids Public Library's History & Special Collections (aka "Local History"). Approximately 20,000 cards enrolling Grand Rapids women for the war effort were filled out and organized in 1918 by the Woman's Committee of the Council of National Defense.

Headed by Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, the national suffrage leader from Big Rapids, the Committee sought ways for women to contribute on the homefront. Locally trained registrars interviewed individual women and recorded their responses on uniquely designed cards. Women could select areas from 118 skill categories in which they were already trained or desired training, in which they were willing to contribute as volunteers or paid workers. For example, your great-aunt might have checked "police patrol." She could also indicate whether she was willing to work anywhere in the world, anywhere in the U.S., or only locally. Every state participated in the enrollment; Michigan, under the leadership of Rev. Caroline Bartlett Crane of Kalamazoo, enrolled 900,000 women, more than any other state.

Are there other registration cards hidden away in libraries and archives around the nation? A rigorous online examination has discovered only one other existing collection of enrollment cards—12,000 from Flint, Michigan, which are now housed in the state archive in Lansing. What an incredible source of data we would have about the nation's women during the World War I period if more could be found. We are fortunate that the GRPL saved this possibly rare resource all these years. At least we can begin mining information about women from two Michigan communities. On October 21, the Grand Rapids Historical Commission's Diana Barrett will provide a preliminary report on the Grand Rapids cards and their context in the national drive.

Clark Reception (continued)

Women's history enthusiasts will be particularly interested in what the book research uncovered about Emily Jewell Clark, whose career of philanthropy and social activism spanned the Clark Retirement Community, the Starr Commonwealth, the Grand Rapids Art Museum, the D.A. Blodgett Home for Children, the Women's City Club, the Ladies Literary Society, local suffrage activities, and more. Despite her broad contributions, many towards organizations that continue to thrive today, Jewell Clark had to a large extent disappeared from the historical record until Clark Retirement Community decided to mark their 100th anniversary with a history of their organization.

Help us to pay tribute to Emily and Melvin Clark in surroundings that would have been very familiar to them, as well as to Clark Retirement Community for one hundred years of service.

Another opportunity to glean the centennial history of Clark Retirement Community will come at this year's Great Lakes History Conference, held at Grand Valley State University. Morrison will present From Superannuates To Senior Citizens: A Century of Eldercare at Grand Rapids' Clark Retirement Community on Saturday, October 21 at the conference. This program will focus on the way society has viewed and treated the elderly over the course of Clark's one hundred years in existence.
