The Greater Grand Rapids Women's History Council (GGRWHC) is open to anyone interested in promoting the historical study of women and women's organizations. One of the council's goals is to have the membership be reflective of all the diverse ethnic, cultural, political, and professional populations of the greater Grand Rapids area.

The GGRWHC's income derives principally from membership dues. Your dues help fund the council's efforts to **research and record the history of the women** who have contributed to the growth and development of the greater Grand Rapids area.

In addition to gathering and transcribing **oral histories** from area women, GGRWHC members research and document the lives of women of earlier generations. The council is also engaged in compiling a **bibliography** of all the materials pertaining to accomplishments of local women.
